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Manual Overview and Support Services

Thank you for purchasing a P2 PowerStation. The P2 PowerStation is a rugged, compact PC that is designed to be used as an industrial operator interface.

The P2 PowerStation features a durable touchscreen and an all-inone PC board that includes a parallel port, two serial ports, and an Ethernet port. The PowerStation's PC architecture allows you to run CTC Parker's MachineShop software.

Please take time to review this manual and the other documentation included with the PowerStation before operating the unit.

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Using this Manual

This manual is designed to help you set up and use your P2 Power-Station. The manual lists the Power-Station's specifications and describes its replacement and optional components. It also explains how to install the unit, how to maintain the unit in good condition, and how to solve common problems that may occur in operation. Please read the information presented in this manual before setting up and using your P2.

This manual is divided into the following chapters:

Chapter 1 — Manual Overview and Support Services:

Presents an overview of this manual, the other documentation and software provided with the P2 PowerStation, and the steps necessary to get your P2 up and running. This chapter also describes CTC's customer support services.

Chapter 2 — Introducing the P2 PowerStation: Describes the P2's specifications and the ports available to connect the P2 to other devices and to a power source. This chapter also describes the PowerStation's drive definitions, memory map, and default jumper settings.

Chapter 3 — Installing the PowerStation: Explains how to install the P2 in a control enclosure and how to start up the unit.

Chapter 4 — Maintaining and Troubleshooting the PowerStation: Explains how to maintain the P2 and how to solve problems that may occur in operation.

Appendix A — **P2 Dimensional Drawings:** Displays dimensional drawings of the P2 that will be useful in mounting the unit.

Documentation Components

The P2 PowerStation documentation set contains all the information you need to install and use the PowerStation. The P2 PowerStation documentation set is described below.

Release Notes—This document is provided whenever there is important information about the PowerStation that does not appear in this manual. Be sure to read any available release notes before operating the unit.

PowerStation Model P2 User Guide—This is the document you are reading. It provides detailed information about the PowerStation and describes how to configure, install, and use the unit. Please read this manual in its entirety before operating the unit.

CPU Manual—This is the manual provided by the manufacturer of the CPU board found in your PowerStation. Please familiarize yourself with this manual before operating the unit.

PowerStation Template—This document is a full-size template of the PowerStation that you can use to prepare the location where you want to install the unit.

Software Components

CTC Parker pre-loads each P2 PowerStation with the MS-DOS 6.22 operating system, the MachineShop Shell, and necessary utilities so that you can run the PowerStation immediately upon its arrival at your facility. CTC Parker also provides backup copies of PowerStation and MachineShop software on the MachineShop Installation CD shipped with the PowerStation.

Getting Started

Now that you have opened the PowerStation package, you are ready to unpack the unit, install it in a permanent location, and download your applications and projects. This section provides an overview of these activities. Additional information is available in the remaining chapters of this manual.

Before You Begin

Before you begin operating the PowerStation, please complete the following steps:

- 1. Unpack the PowerStation, and verify that you have received all the components you ordered.
- 2. Fill out the product registration card, and return it to CTC Parker. When you register your unit, you will receive a trial membership in CTC Parker's Product Support Program, which provides complimentary telephone technical support, information on product updates, and service bulletins.
- 3. Back up the CTC software that was pre-installed on your unit using the Windows[®] File Manager/Explorer or the MS-DOS[®] Diskcopy command.

Install the PowerStation

When you finish unpacking the PowerStation, you are ready to install the unit in a permanent location. See Chapter 3 of this manual, *Installing the PowerStation*, for complete installation instructions.

Download Applications and Projects

The P2 PowerStation is a runtime-only system, which means that you must develop your applications or projects on a PC and download them to the PowerStation.

Note Throughout this manual, all references to "development PC" or "development system" refer to the computer you use to develop applications or projects.

See the documentation that came with your development software for information about how to develop your applications or projects and download them to the PowerStation.

Introducing the P2 PowerStation

The P2 PowerStation is designed to give you an operator interface solution that is powerful, cost-effective, and very easy to use.

In this chapter, you will learn about the P2 PowerStation's specifications and available connectors, its drive definitions, memory map, and jumper settings. The chapter also explains design issues concerning PowerStation touchscreens.

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Specifications

This section describes important specifications for the P2 Power-Station. Please familiarize yourself with these specifications before operating the unit.

Important Limit the PowerStation's exposure to adverse conditions such as dust, oil, moisture, and corrosive vapors to minimize maintenance and repair costs.

> Remember that the temperature within a protective enclosure is generally higher than the external temperature. Thus, if the PowerStation is operating inside an enclosure at temperature levels above its rated ambient temperature, you must cool the enclosure.

Important

The PowerStation's power supply automatically detects the input voltage level and adjusts accordingly. However, always use reliable sources of power, and isolate all communication cables from AC power lines to enhance noise immunity.

If possible, locate the PowerStation away from machinery that produces intense electrical noise (arc welders, etc.). Otherwise, isolate the input power to the PowerStation from the equipment generating electrical noise.

Special note for units with replaceable lithium batteries



There is danger of explosion if the battery is incorrectly replaced. Replace the battery only with the same type of battery or an equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer. Dispose of used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions.


All PowerStation surfaces exposed to the outside of your enclosure are resistive to the following chemicals:

- Commercial glass cleaners
- Ammonia (10% dilute solution)
- Motor oil
- · Hydraulic fluid
- Diesel fuel
- Gasoline (leaded, unleaded)
- Silicone based lubricant
- Alcohol (ethyl, methyl)
- Automatic transmission fluid

Important Sustained exposure to brake fluid or Gunk[®] brand degreaser can cause damage to monitor materials.

Available Connectors

The P2 PowerStation includes many of the same ports found on most PCs. All P2 PowerStations have two serial ports, a VGA video port, a parallel port, a PS/2-style keyboard port, an Ethernet port, and a Compact Flash connector. The following illustration shows the available connectors on a P2.



Serial Ports

The PowerStation has two serial ports that you can use to communicate with external devices. These ports support baud rates of up to 115 Kbaud. The COM1 port supports RS-232, while COM2 supports RS-232, RS-422, and RS-485 communication standards.

The communication standard you select for COM2 depends upon the distance between the PowerStation and the controller, as well as the communication standards that the controller supports. Use a standard DB9 connector for communicating with this port.

Note If you are using RS-232 communications, the length of the serial cable should not exceed 50 feet (15 meters).

RS-422 and RS-485 communications offer greater noise immunity than RS-232. These standards increase the maximum cable length to 4,000 feet (1,200 meters).

RS-422 communications are full-duplex (can send and receive simultaneously) while RS-485 communications are half-duplex (can only send or receive at one time).

For either configuration, be careful not to connect any wires to unused connector pins. Information on the specific connection required for the Interact or MachineLogic drivers you will use is located in the Help file associated with the driver.

COM1 pinouts


COM2 pinouts

If you need to make a cable for communicating with COM2, the following table shows the pinouts and signal information for this port. COM2 is set to the RS-485 protocol by default. To change COM2 to the RS-232 or RS-422 protocol, you must change the COM2 jumper settings. See *COM2 jumpers* on page 65 of this manual for information about how to change these settings.

Cable diagrams


The following illustrations represent the pinouts and cable diagrams required for communicating with COM1 or COM2 using the RS-232 protocol. Also shown are cable diagrams for communicating with COM2 using the RS-422 or RS-485 protocol.



Important Be careful not to connect any wires to unused connector pins.

Connecting to a PC

To transfer files from a PC to the PowerStation, connect a serial cable with a null modem to an available serial port on the PC. Connect the other end of the cable to the serial port on the PowerStation. If you need to construct your own cables, refer to the illustrations below.



Connecting a serial mouse

If you need to connect a serial mouse to the PowerStation, you must use either COM1 or COM2.

To configure the PowerStation to use a serial mouse, perform the following steps:

- 1. If you will be using COM2 for your mouse, verify that COM2 is configured for RS-232 communications. See *COM2 jumpers* on page 65 of this manual for information about how to change the communications protocol for this port.
- 2. Connect the serial mouse to the port that you configured, and restart the PowerStation.

Connecting to a serial printer

To connect the PowerStation to a serial printer, you must change the mode settings for one of the serial ports to match those of your printer. The easiest way to change these settings is to use MODE.COM. MODE.COM can modify the following options:

baud: 110, 150, 300, 600, 1200, 2400, 4800, 9600

parity: N - none, O - odd, E - even

databits: either 7 or 8 **stopbits:** either 1 or 2

CTC Parker installs MODE.COM on the PowerStation's Compact Flash card. You will make a backup copy of the file when you create the PowerStation Start disk from the MachineShop Installation CD shipped with your PowerStation. See the *MachineShop Installation Booklet* for instructions on how to create this disk.

To use MODE.COM, complete the following steps:

1. From the Windows desktop, open the Startup directory within Interact project:

```
C:\Machshop\Projects\Interact\*Project
Name*\Startup\
```

2. Within the Startup folder, create a new AUTOEXEC.BAT file with the following line:

MODE COM#:baud,parity,databits,stopbits

3. Launch the MachineShop Toolbar and download the project that contains AUTOEXEC.BAT and MODE.COM from your development system to the PowerStation.

During the download, MachineShop transfers the AUTOEXEC.BAT file you created in step 2 into the \STARTUP directory specified by the INTERACT_STARTUP environment variable. This environment variable resides in the PowerStation's AUTOEXEC.BAT file.

When MachineShop finishes the download, you will be asked whether you want to restart the PowerStation or not.


4. Restart the PowerStation.

MODE.COM will configure the COM port to the required baud rate. For example, if you are communicating at 9600, NONE, 8, and 1, use:

MODE COM1: 9600, N, 8, 1

Note To print to a port configured for downloading, you must disable downloading for that port and restart the PowerStation. Restarting the PowerStation allows MODE.COM to reset the communication settings for that port. Use the Download Enable command on the Settings menu of the MachineShop Shell to disable downloading.

Use the following diagram as a reference when connecting a serial printer to the PowerStation.



VGA Video Port

The VGA Video port has been disabled because the timing requirements of the PowerStation's LCD and STN displays differ from those of other displays. The PowerStation has a VGA Video port that allows you to use an external SVGA monitor in place of the PowerStation's flat-panel display. On TFT units, this port allows you to use an external monitor and the flat-panel display simultaneously. This port supports monochrome and high resolution color displays. Refer to the CPU manual shipped with your PowerStation for the video port's pinout information.

Note The maximum resolution of the PowerStation flat-panel display is 640 x 480, but the CRT port can support up to 1024 x 768.

Parallel Port

The PowerStation parallel port (LPT1) pinout is identical to the standard IBM parallel printer port. The LPT1 connector pinout is shown in the table below.

Connecting to a parallel printer

The PowerStation can interface with any parallel printer designed for use with IBM PC-compatible computers. Connect a printer to the port marked LPT1 using a standard IBM PC parallel cable.

Keyboard Port

The P2 PowerStation's CPU board includes a mini-DIN keyboard port. This port can accept input from keyboards that have a PS/2 connector. This port can also accept input from IBM AT-compatible keyboards, including 84-key standard keyboards and 101-key enhanced keyboards. Connect the keyboard to the PowerStation using the supplied keyboard adapter cable.

Important Do not connect a PS/2 mouse to the keyboard port on units with the PCA-6135 386 CPU card. This port is only intended to be used as a keyboard port. If you need to connect a mouse to the PowerStation, you must use a serial mouse. See *Connecting a serial mouse* on page 18 of this manual for instructions on how to connect a serial mouse to the PowerStation.

Note PC/XT keyboards will not function with the P2 PowerSta-

Ethernet Port

The P2 PowerStation has an Ethernet RJ-45 port that allows you to connect the PowerStation to a Local Area Network. This port is software compatible with the NE-2000 protocol and supports all major network operating systems. Consult the manual that came with your network software for setup options.

Compact Flash

The P2 PowerStation comes with a Compact Flash (CF) card that is like a removable hard drive. It provides non-volatile memory storage. A CF card is often used as a supplement to, or a replacement for, a hard drive because the CF is well-suited for environments in which the PowerStation may be vibrated or shaken. The CF card is recognized as drive C. Although the CF is removable, it cannot be removed while the PowerStation is running because it is used as an IDE drive.

CTC Parker recommends that you purchase at least one additional CF card to serve as a backup for your primary CF card; you may wish to have several cards to store different projects. You can purchase additional CF cards from CTC Parker.


Drive Definitions and Memory Map

The figure below illustrates how the P2 PowerStation allocates conventional memory and extended memory. The range of address references is listed next to each device.



Memory Guidelines

If you are using Interact or MachineLogic to develop your HMI applications, refer to the memory guidelines listed below when you develop projects. The following table lists guidelines concerning the capacity and use of memory for runtime and development systems.

Memory Type	Runtime
System DRAM	8MB system memory runs APM, PTM, and AMM runtime modules and two drivers. Extra modules require more memory.
Compact Flash	8MB flash memory can store APM, PTM, AMM, plus four additional runtime modules, two drivers, and approximately thirty screens. Extra modules require more storage (four modules/MB). Up to 1MB is needed to store MachineLogic applications.

Adding PC/104 Cards


The P2 PowerStation supports PC/104 expansion cards. These cards perform a variety of functions that are typically done by traditional plug-in expansion cards. However, the advantage of using PC/104 cards is that you can stack several cards together, saving valuable space.

See *Adding PC/104 Cards* on page 60 of this manual for guidelines about adding PC/104 cards to the PowerStation.

Jumper Settings


Like most PCs, the P2 PowerStation uses jumpers to set addresses and enable or disable various functions of the system. The PowerStation's Ethernet/Power Supply board has three sets of jumpers, shown below, that are user-configurable.

- JP7 allows you to change the touchscreen I/O address.
- JP1 allows you to restore the Ethernet port to a known configuration of IRQ 10 and I/O address 240H.
- JP6 allows you to change the touchscreen IRQ.



Note The preceding illustration shows the Ethernet/Power Supply board with the CPU card removed. See *Removing the CPU card* on page 64 for instructions on how to remove this card. The CPU card also has jumpers that may be changed. Refer to the CPU manual that came with your PowerStation for information about these jumpers.

The following sections describe the default settings for these jumpers and what the jumpers control. In this discussion, jumpers set to "on" and "off" will look like those in the illustration below.




Note "Off" jumpers can be completely removed or placed as in the illustration above.

For information about how to change the jumper settings, see *Changing Jumper Settings* on page 62 of this manual.

JP7 This set of jumpers configures the address for the touchscreen. It is configured by turning jumpers A and B "on" or "off." The chart below demonstrates the on/off combinations for each of the ports.

COM2 (2F8h)	off	on

The touchscreen jumpers are set to I/O address COM3 (3E8h) with the A jumper "on" and the B jumper "off" by default. The touch-screen could also be configured to the COM4 (2E8h) address by turning the A and B jumpers "on," as shown below.



Important

After changing the jumper settings for the touchscreen I/O address, you must change the touchscreen configuration drivers for the changes to be implemented. See *Reconfiguring the Touchscreen Driver* on page 48 for more information about how to do this.

- JP1 This jumper is used to restore the Ethernet configuration to IRQ 10 and I/O 240H. The jumper is located near the IDE hard drive connector on the Ethernet/Power Supply board. To restore the Ethernet configuration to IRQ 10 and I/O 240H, install a clip on this jumper.
- JP6 This set of jumpers is used to configure the hardware IRQ for the touchscreen. The touchscreen IRQ jumpers are located at the lower left corner of the Ethernet/Power Supply board, just beneath the CPU card. CTC Parker configures these jumpers to use IRQ 11.

COM2 Jumpers

CTC Parker configures the COM2 serial port for RS-485 communications. However, you can configure this port to communicate using RS-232 or RS-422 by changing the jumper settings on the CPU card. For information about how to change these jumpers, see *Changing the Jumper Settings on* page 62 of this manual or refer to the CPU manual that came with your PowerStation.

Design Issues

You will only need to read this section if your PowerStation is using Interact, CTC Parker's HMI software. If you are not using Interact, you may proceed to Chapter 3, *Installing the PowerStation*.

Using a Touchscreen with Interact

If you are using a touchscreen with Interact, and your application uses PTM Slide input tools, be sure to select the Arrow cursor type using the Interact Settings command in Application Manager. When you select the Arrow cursor type, touching the Slide tool selects the tool, and moving your finger over the touchscreen moves the slide knob.

If you use the Box Cursor type, the slide knob immediately moves to the location where you press the tool. For example, if the knob is currently positioned at 100, and you press the touchscreen at a value of 800, the knob immediately moves to 800 and writes this value to the controller.

Warning

Using the Box Cursor with a touchscreen and an application that uses Slide input tools may cause you to inadvertently select input values. If your application requires you to use a cursor, select the Arrow cursor type instead.

Installing the PowerStation

You are now ready to install the P2 PowerStation in a permanent location. This chapter will help you select an appropriate location for the unit. It also provides instructions for creating a cutout for the unit and describes how to install and start up the unit.

Installing the PowerStation	3.
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Selecting a Location

The first step to installing the PowerStation is to select an appropriate location for the unit. This is the most important aspect of installation because the location you select can affect the PowerStation's performance, ease-of-use, and life-expectancy. This section provides some guidelines that you should follow when selecting a location for the PowerStation.

Class 1, Division 2 Guidelines

If you purchased a Class I, Division 2-compliant PowerStation, you must always follow these guidelines to maintain a safe operating environment:

- 1. Suitable for use in Class I, Division 2, Groups A, B, C, and D hazardous locations only.
- 2. **Warning: Explosion Hazard**—Do not disconnect equipment, replace, or insert cards unless power has been switched off, or the area is known to be non-hazardous.
- 3. **Warning: Explosion Hazard**—Substitution of components may impair suitability for Class I, Division 2.
- 4. Make sure that the PowerStation's power cord is always secured to the unit using the supplied L-bracket.
- 5. When performing field wiring, always use copper wire with 60C or 60/75C insulation and a tightening torque of 7.0 lb/in. (0.79 N-m).

Environmental Guidelines

The environment is the area where the PowerStation will be located. In general, you should select a place that limits the unit's exposure to adverse conditions such as dust, oil, moisture, and corrosive vapors.

Touchscreen considerations

The PowerStation's touchscreen is designed to meet the NEMA 4 rating. You should mount the PowerStation in an enclosure that supports this rating in order to provide further protection.

The PowerStation's touchscreen is resistant to a variety of chemicals. See *Faceplate Chemical Resistance* on page 13 of this manual for a list of these chemicals. Make sure that the touch-screen is exposed only to the chemicals on this list.

Electrical Guidelines

To minimize unwanted electrical interference, select a location away from machinery that produces intense electrical noise. If you cannot do this, isolate input power to the unit, and separate all data communication cables used with the unit from AC power lines.

Important In order to comply with UL 508 and 1604 requirements, use copper wire with 60C or 60/75C insulation and a tightening torque of 7.0 lb./in. (0.79 N-m) when connecting field terminal wiring to the PowerStation.

See *Electrical Specifications* on page 12 of this manual for a list of the PowerStation's electrical specifications. Make sure that your power source is completely compatible with the PowerStation before starting the unit.

Temperature Guidelines

You can safely operate the PowerStation within the temperature range specified in the *Environmental Specifications* section on page 11 of this manual. However, if you are using a protective enclosure, remember that the temperature within an enclosure is generally higher than the external temperature. If the PowerStation is operating inside an enclosure at temperature levels above its rated ambient temperature, you must cool the enclosure.

Enclosure Guidelines

Select an enclosure that is large enough to allow free airflow in and around the unit. You should allow a minimum of 2 inches between the enclosure and the top, bottom, and sides of the Power-Station.

Also, make sure that the surface of the enclosure on which the PowerStation is mounted is flat and free of raised or depressed areas.

Backlight Accessibility Guidelines

Occasionally, you may need to replace the PowerStation's backlight bulbs. A bulb replacement kit, including instructions for replacing the bulbs, is available from CTC Parker. However, to replace the backlight bulbs, you must be able to remove the PowerStation's back cover and the backlight assembly from the unit. Be sure to design your enclosure with this in mind. Otherwise, you will have to completely remove the PowerStation from its enclosure in order to replace the backlight bulbs.

AC Power Guidelines

If you have purchased the optional AC Power Supply for the PowerStation, you must select a location that provides protection from dust, oil, moisture, and corrosive vapors. If you have a large enough enclosure, you can mount the Power Supply either on the back of the PowerStation or elsewhere in the enclosure with the unit.

Preparing for Installation

Once you have selected a location for the PowerStation, you can begin preparing it to accept the unit. Before installing the PowerStation, you will need to create a cutout for the unit and clean the area of any dirt or debris that might come in contact with the unit. Also, if you plan to operate the unit using AC power, and you have purchased CTC's optional AC Power Supply, you may want to prepare a location for the Power Supply. Procedures for creating the cutout and preparing to use an AC Power Supply are described below.

Creating the Cutout

The PowerStation comes with a template that is designed to simplify the task of creating the cutout for the unit. Be sure to follow the drill hole and cutout dimensions on the template precisely so that the PowerStation will properly seal in its enclosure.

To create a cutout for the PowerStation, complete the following steps:

- 1. Attach the template securely to the mounting surface.
- 2. Cut out the shaded area of the template referred to as the "Panel Cutout Area." To maintain the flatness of the mounting surface, CTC Parker recommends that you **cut** out the Panel Cutout Area rather than punch it out.
- 3. Drill the appropriate number of 0.23-inch diameter mounting holes as seen on the template. Once again, be careful to protect the flatness of the surface.
- 4. Debur the edges of the cutout area and the drill holes.
- 5. Ensure that the mounting surface has remained flat and that the panel surface is clean and free of foreign materials.
- 6. See *P2 PowerStation Dimensional Drawings* on page 79 of this manual for the depth and port dimensions of your Power-Station. Use these dimensions to customize the mounting of your unit.

Preparing to Use an AC Power Supply

You will only need to read this section if you intend to operate the Power-Station using AC power. If you intend to operate the Power-Station using DC power, you can proceed to *Installing the Power-Station on* page 34 of this manual.

If you plan to operate the PowerStation with AC power, and you have purchased CTC's optional AC Power Supply and the AC Power Supply Mounting Kit, you will receive with the Mounting Kit a template that you can use to prepare a location for the Power Supply. That location can be inside or outside the enclosure where the PowerStation is installed.

Note If you decide to mount the Power Supply in an enclosure, mounting it on the bottom or side of the enclosure will provide the best convection cooling.

To prepare the Power Supply mounting surface, complete the following steps:

- 1. Securely attach the template to the mounting surface.
- 2. Drill and debur four 0.17" (4.3mm) holes.

Installing the PowerStation

Once you have prepared the location for the PowerStation, you can install the unit. Installation will involve mounting the PowerStation and, if you are using CTC's optional AC Power Supply, mounting the Power Supply. Both procedures are described below.

Mounting the PowerStation

For your convenience, CTC Parker includes all the necessary mounting hardware with the unit.

To mount the unit, complete the following steps:

- 1. Gently insert the PowerStation into the cutout.
- 2. Install a nut on each of the protruding studs on the back of the PowerStation's bezel, and tighten each nut to a torque of 17 inch/pounds.

Important The unit must fit flush in the enclosure. Tighten the nuts in a crosswise sequence to ensure a good seal and prevent damage to the unit.

Mounting the AC Power Supply

The AC Power Supply is designed to be mounted using two metal brackets. These brackets are secured to the mounting surface using four screws. For your convenience, CTC Parker provides all necessary hardware for mounting the Power Supply in a special mounting kit.

To mount the Power Supply, complete the following steps:

- 1. Prepare the power source for the unit by sliding the positive and negative wires into the appropriate slots on the power connector.
- 2. Connect the ground cable from the power connector to an earth ground.
- 3. Attach the Power Supply to the mounting surface using the supplied metal brackets.
- 4. Connect the power cord from the Power Supply to a 90-250VAC power source.
- 5. Secure the power cable to the Power Supply using the supplied L-shaped metal bracket and nut.
- 6. Attach the power connector that you prepared in steps 1 and 2 to the back of the PowerStation.

Starting Up the PowerStation



Once the PowerStation has been mounted, you are ready to start up the unit. This procedure is described below.

Before connecting a power cord to your unit, make sure that you have read and understood *Electrical Specifications* on page 12 of this manual and *Testing Specifications* on page 13. Also, be sure to follow the guidelines listed below:

- For **permanently connected equipment**, a readily accessible disconnect device must be incorporated in the fixed wiring.
- For **pluggable equipment**, the socket-outlet must be installed near the equipment and should be easily accessible.

Important Proper installation of the PowerStation in European Union countries requires the use of a harmonized power cord (the power cord must be identified with the <HAR> symbol).

Make sure that the PowerStation is connected to the main

supply only with a harmonized power cord.

- 1. Make sure that the PowerStation is turned off.
- 2. Connect the power cord to your voltage source. Voltage input to the unit should be within the range specified in *Electrical Specifications* on page 12 of this manual.

Note If you are using an external AC Power Supply, you must first connect the Power Supply to the DC output on the back of the PowerStation; then, connect the power input to a 90-250VAC power source.

- 3. Connect the power cord plug to the PowerStation.
- 4. Turn the PowerStation on.

The fan should come on, followed immediately by the display. The PowerStation will automatically load the MachineShop Shell.

You are now ready to download a project to the PowerStation. If you are using MachineShop software, refer to the *MachineShop Getting Started Guide* for information about how to download projects to the PowerStation.

Maintaining and Troubleshooting the PowerStation

The P2 PowerStation has been designed to provide years of trouble-free operation even in the harshest environments. However, occasionally, you may need to perform routine maintenance on some of the PowerStation's components.

This chapter provides instructions on PowerStation maintenance, as well as steps for troubleshooting problems that may occur in operation.

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Cleaning the **Touchscreen**

Occasionally, you may wish to clean the PowerStation's touchscreen. Clean the touchscreen using warm, soapy water and a cloth. You may also use any non-abrasive cleaner. See Faceplate Chemical Resistance on page 13 for a list of substances the screen can resist with no visible effect.

Do not use any harsh material or powder, such as steel wool or abrasive cleansers, to clean the polyester surface. The surface is sensitive to scraping, sharp blows, and punctures. Therefore, keep screwdrivers or other sharp objects away from the surface of the touchscreen.

Warning Do not clean the unit while Interact is in Run mode. Clean the unit while power is removed to keep from inadvertently activating an Interact device (button, slide, etc.).

Using the **Compact Flash** Card

The P2 PowerStation uses a removable Compact Flash (CF) card for storage purposes. You can remove the CF card, update the application files on it from a PC, and then reinstall the CF card in the PowerStation.

CTC Parker recommends that you purchase at least one additional CF card to serve as a backup for your primary CF card; you may wish to have several cards to store different projects. You can purchase additional CF cards from CTC Parker.

The remainder of this section explains how to remove and replace the CF card and how to reformat the Compact Flash.

Removing and Replacing the Compact Flash

To remove and replace the Compact Flash card, complete the following steps:

1. Turn off the PowerStation.

Important Make sure that the PowerStation is turned off when inserting or removing the CF card.

- 2. Face the back, left-hand side of the unit, and grasp the flash card.
- 3. Remove the CF card by sliding it out of its slot toward you, as shown in the illustration on the next page.



4. When you are ready, reinstall the CF card by carefully inserting the card into the slot and pushing it into the slot until the card is securely seated.

Reformatting the Compact Flash

This section explains the procedure to create a bootable Compact Flash (CF) card for the PowerStation from a "blank" CF card. This procedure may be necessary to replace deleted or corrupted critical files on the card or to prepare a new card for use.

Note This procedure will only work correctly under MS-DOS 6.22, Windows 95, or Windows 98. Do not run this utility under Windows NT.

This procedure requires the following items:

- PC with a Type II PCMCIA slot or a CF card reader, and 3.5" floppy drive. The PC should be running MS-DOS 6.22, Windows 95, or Windows 98.
- CF-to-PCMCIA adapter (for use with PCMCIA slot only).
- MS-DOS 6.22 and Utilities Installation Disk.
- PowerStation Start Disk
- MachineShop Shell Installation Disk

Note The PowerStation Start Disk and MachineShop Shell Installation Disk make up the Runtime Workstation Disk Set, which you can create from the MachineShop Installation CD shipped with your PowerStation. See the *MachineShop Installation Booklet* for instructions on how to create these disks.

To reformat the CF card, complete the following steps:

Turn off the PowerStation.

Important Make sure that the PowerStation is turned off when inserting or removing the CF card.

- 2. Remove the CF card from the PowerStation's flash card slot, as described in the preceding section.
- 3. Insert the CF card into the PC's PCMCIA slot, using the CF-to-PCMCIA adapter as shown below, or into a CF card reader.



The computer should recognize and configure the card as an ATA card, assigning an additional drive letter for the card (e.g., D)

Note In this example, drive D represents the PCMCIA card or card reader; however, your system may assign a different drive letter to either of these devices.

- 4. Enter MS-DOS mode.
- 5. At the DOS prompt, type FORMAT D:
- 6. Press Enter to execute this command.
- 7. Insert the MS-DOS 6.22 and Utilities Disk into the PC's floppy drive.

Important If you are performing the install procedure in a DOS window under Windows 95 or 98, you must execute the command LOCK D: before entering the INSTALL command shown below. After MS-DOS installation is complete, execute the UNLOCK D: command.

- 8. At the DOS prompt, type A: Install A: D:
- 9. Press Enter to execute this command.

This will install the MS-DOS 6.22 system files, utilities, and necessary drivers onto drive D (or the drive assigned to the CF card).

Note You will have two choices when installing DOS: a small installation or a large one. A small installation will install approximately 5 files in the DOS directory. A large installation will install approximately 1MB of files in the DOS directory.

- 10. Eject the MS-DOS 6.22 Disk from the PowerStation's floppy drive, and insert the PowerStation Start Disk.
- 11. At the DOS prompt, type A: INSTALL A: D:
- 12. Press Enter to execute this command.

You will be asked whether you wish to install the standard CTC AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files as part of the installation. CTC recommends that you type Y for Yes.

If you answer Yes, the existing AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files will be renamed as AUTOEXEC.OLD and CONFIG.OLD. If you answer No, the factory-default files will be copied as AUTOEXEC.CTC and CONFIG.CTC in the root directory of drive D, and you will need to manually update your existing AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files later.

13. After the AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files have been copied onto your system, press any key to continue.

You will be asked if this installation is for a Model P1 Power-Station.

14. Type N for No.

The PowerStation Start installation is complete.

15. Eject the PowerStation Start Disk from the PC's floppy drive, and insert the MachineShop Shell Installation disk.

- 16. At the DOS prompt, type A: INSTALL A:\ D:\
 You will be asked if you would like to continue with the installation.
- 17. Type Y for Yes in order to continue.

 The MachineShop Shell installation is complete.
- 18. Eject the CF-to-PCMCIA adapter, and remove the CF from the adapter, or remove the CF card from the card reader.
- 19. Insert the CF into PowerStation's flash card slot.
- 20. Start up the PowerStation.

 The PowerStation will automatically load the MachineShop Shell.
- 21. Recalibrate the touchscreen. See *Recalibrating the Touchscreen* on page 52 of this manual for complete instructions.

Reinstalling the PowerStation Utilities

The PowerStation utilities come pre-installed on your PowerStation's Compact Flash card. If you need to reinstall these utilities, you can do so by using the PowerStation Start Disk.

Note The PowerStation Start Disk is part of the Runtime Workstation Disk Set, which you can create from the Machine-Shop Installation CD shipped with your PowerStation. See the *MachineShop Installation Booklet* for instructions on how to create this disk.

To reinstall the PowerStation utilities, complete the following steps:

1. Turn off the PowerStation.

Important Make sure that the PowerStation is turned off when inserting or removing the CF card.

- 2. Remove the CF card from the PowerStation's flash card slot, as described in the preceding section.
- 3. Insert the CF card into the PC's PCMCIA slot, using the CF-to-PCMCIA adapter as shown below, or into a CF card reader.



The computer should recognize and configure the card as an ATA card, assigning an additional drive letter for the card (e.g., D)

Note In this example, drive D represents the PCMCIA card or card reader; however, your system may assign a different drive letter to either of these devices.

- 4. Enter MS-DOS mode.
- 5. Insert the PowerStation Start Disk into the PC's floppy drive.
- 6. At the DOS prompt, type A: INSTALL A: D:

7. Press Enter to execute this command.

You will be asked whether you wish to install the standard CTC AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files as part of the installation. CTC recommends that you type Y for Yes.

If you answer Yes, the existing AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files will be renamed as AUTOEXEC.OLD and CONFIG.OLD. If you answer No, the factory-default files will be copied as AUTOEXEC.CTC and CONFIG.CTC in the root directory of drive D, and you will need to manually update your existing AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files later.

8. After the AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files have been copied onto your system, press any key to continue.

You will be asked if this installation is for a Model P1 Power-Station.

9. Type N for No.

The PowerStation Utilities installation is complete.

- 10. Eject the CF-to-PCMCIA adapter, and remove the CF from the adapter, or remove the CF card from the card reader.
- 11. Insert the CF into PowerStation's flash card slot.
- 12. Start up the PowerStation.

Reinstalling the Shell Software

The MachineShop Shell comes pre-installed on your PowerStation's Compact Flash card. If you need to reinstall the Shell, you can do so by using the MachineShop Shell Installation disk.

To install the Shell software, complete the following steps:

1. Turn off the PowerStation.

Important Make sure that the PowerStation is turned off when inserting or removing the CF card.

- 2. Remove the CF card from the PowerStation's flash card slot, as described in the preceding section.
- 3. Insert the CF card into the PC's PCMCIA slot, using the CF-to-PCMCIA adapter as shown below, or into a CF card reader.



The computer should recognize and configure the card as an ATA card, assigning an additional drive letter for the card (e.g., D)

Note In this example, drive D represents the PCMCIA card or card reader; however, your system may assign a different drive letter to either of these devices.

- 4. Enter MS-DOS mode.
- 5. Insert the MachineShop Shell Installation disk in your PC's floppy drive.
- 6. At the DOS prompt, type INSTALL A: D:
 You will be asked if you would like to continue with the installation.
- 7. Type Y for Yes in order to continue.

The MachineShop Shell installation is complete.

- 8. Eject the CF-to-PCMCIA adapter, and remove the CF from the adapter, or remove the CF card from the card reader.
- 9. Insert the CF into PowerStation's flash card slot.
- 10. Start up the PowerStation.

The PowerStation will automatically load the MachineShop Shell.

Modifying the AUTOEXEC.BAT File

The lines shown below must appear in the AUTOEXEC.BAT file for the PowerStation to operate properly. The AUTOEXEC.BAT file that CTC Parker supplies includes these lines and is located in the \CTC directory of the PowerStation in a file called AUTOEXEC.CTC

Make sure that the AUTOEXEC.BAT file on your PowerStation includes the command lines shown in the left-hand column of the table below.

Reconfiguring the Touchscreen Driver

CTC Parker installs in the PowerStation the appropriate touchscreen drivers for your unit's operating system. However, you may have to reconfigure the touchscreen driver if it becomes lost or corrupted.

Note If you are using an older PowerStation, your touchscreen configuration procedure and the screens displayed may differ from those described in the following instructions.

You will use the CALL TOUCH_PATH%\INIT.BAT file to configure the touchscreen. This file initializes the touchscreen driver.

Important

If you purchased a PowerStation with the touchscreen disabled, and you want to enable it, remove the REM statement that appears at the beginning of the line CALL %TOUCH_PATH%\TCHINIT.BAT. Likewise, if you purchase a PowerStation with the touchscreen enabled, and you want to disable it, add the word REM to the beginning of this line.

If you need to permanently disable the touch screen, remove the line CALL $\%\,TOUCH_PATH\%\TCHINIT.BAT$ from your system.


The CALL %TOUCH_PATH%\TCHINIT.BAT line accepts the command line parameter NOBOUNDS. This parameter specifies the touchscreen boundaries in Interact. **Do not** change this parameter.

To configure the touchscreen drivers, complete the following steps:

1. On the MachineShop Shell main menu, press Settings.
The settings submenu will appear as shown below.



2. From the Settings submenu, press the PWRSTA button. The PowerStation Settings screen will appear as shown below.



3. Press the Calibrate Touchscrn button.

A message window will appear, reminding you that a keyboard is required.

4. When you have a keyboard connected to the PowerStation, press the Yes button to continue.

The following screen will appear.

7. Type I to change the Interrupt or type 1, 2, 3 or 4 to change the COM port.

Note If you use Set COM3 or Set COM4, the COM port will default to COM1 and COM2 IRQs. You will need to reset the IRQs.

- 8. Type A to change the Address.
- 9. Type C to change the Connection.

Important The Connection must be set to UART.

- 10. Type 0 to set your touchscreen driver.
- 11. Press Esc or X to exit.

Important You must restart your system for the changes to take effect.

Recalibrating the Touchscreen

The PowerStation's touchscreen is calibrated before leaving CTC Parker. However, you may need to recalibrate the touchscreen when you begin using the PowerStation for the first time or whenever the cursor location and the location on the screen where the user touches do not match.

The MachineShop Shell comes with a calibration utility that you can use to calibrate the touchscreen in DOS mode. The calibration utility requires a keyboard and involves calibrating the touch-screen for text and for graphics.

Note If you are using an older PowerStation, your touchscreen configuration procedure and the screens displayed may differ from those described in the following instructions.

To calibrate the touchscreen, complete the following steps:

1. On the MachineShop Shell main menu, press the Settings button.

The Settings submenu will appear as shown below.



2. On the Settings submenu, press the PWRSTA button.

The PowerStation Settings menu will appear as shown below.



3. Press the Calibrate Touchscrn button.

You will be prompted that a keyboard is needed to calibrate the touchscreen. Then you will be asked if you want to continue.

- 4. If necessary, install a keyboard on the PowerStation. See *Keyboard Port* on page 21 of this manual for information about connecting a keyboard to the PowerStation.
- 5. When you have attached a keyboard to the PowerStation, press the Yes button to continue the calibration.

The following screen will appear.

- 8. Type C again for Calibrate.
- 9. When the next screen appears, follow the instructions on the screen by touching each square as it appears—there will be three all together.

After you touch the third square, a new screen will appear.

- When the new screen appears, type V to select a new video mode.
- 11. When the next screen appears, type 0 for 640 x 480 16 color Graphics mode.
- 12. Press Enter.
- 13. When the next screen appears, type C for Calibrate.
- 14. When the next screen appears, follow the instructions on the screen by touching each square as it appears—there will be three all together.

After you touch the third square, a new screen will appear.

- 15. When the new screen appears, type V for video mode.
- 16. When the next screen appears, type 11 for 640 x 480 256 color Graphics mode.
- 17. Press Enter.
- 18. When the next screen appears, type C for Calibrate.

19. When the next screen appears, follow the instructions on the screen by touching each square as it appears—there will be three all together.

After you touch the third square, a new screen will appear.

- 20. When the new screen appears, type O for OK.

Important After calibrating the touchscreen, enter Interact in Program Mode. Verify that the cursor appears on the screen where you touch. If it does not, recalibrate the touchscreen. The calibration must be accurate to avoid activating a button unintentionally during Run Mode.

Configuring the **Ethernet** Interface

The \NET directory of the PowerStation's CF card contains a configuration utility and all drivers necessary to configure the Ethernet interface. Backup copies of these files are included on the PowerStation Start Disk.

Note The PowerStation Start Disk is part of the Runtime Workstation Disk Set, which you can create from the Machine-Shop Installation CD shipped with your PowerStation. See the MachineShop Installation Booklet for instructions on how to create this disk.:

Interact will also communicate over any network or operating system that supports NetBIOS protocols. Examples include

Lantastic, TCP/IP, Microsoft, and IBM. If you need assistance with NetBIOS and networking, consult your network administrator or a certified network technician.

Performing Internal Maintenance

This section includes helpful information for performing internal maintenance on the PowerStation. To prevent injury to yourself or damage to the PowerStation, be sure to read and understand the procedures described in this section before performing them. This section will show you how to perform the following operations:

- Disassembling the PowerStation
- Replacing DRAM
- Adding PC/104 cards
- Changing jumper settings
- Reassembling the PowerStation



Warning For safety reasons, the PowerStation should be opened only by qualified service personnel.

Electrostatic Discharge Precautions



Modern integrated electronic devices, especially CPUs and memory chips, are extremely sensitive to electrostatic discharges (ESD) and fields. Before you disassemble the PowerStation, be sure to follow these simple precautions to protect you and the PowerStation from harm resulting from ESD.

- To avoid electric shock, always disconnect the power from the PowerStation before you remove the back cover. Do not touch any components of the CPU card or other cards while the PowerStation is on.
- Disconnect power before making any hardware configuration changes. The sudden rush of power as you connect a jumper or install a card may damage sensitive electronic components.
- Only handle internal components in an ESD-safe location, using appropriate grounding methods.
- Wear a grounding wrist strap for continuous protection.
- Always ground yourself to remove any static charge before you touch the CPU card.

- Be particularly careful not to touch the chip connectors.
- Keep any card in its anti-static packaging when it is not installed in the PowerStation and place it on a static dissipative mat when you are working on it.

Disassembling the **PowerStation**

If you have read and understand the ESD safety precautions, you are ready to disassemble the PowerStation.

Important As you begin to disassemble the unit, you will encounter several different screw sizes. When you reassemble the PowerStation, be sure to replace the same size screw in the same location as the one that was removed. Failure to do so could damage the unit.

To disassemble the unit, complete the following steps:

- 1. Turn off power the PowerStation.
- 2. Disconnect the unit from the power source.
- 3. Remove the unit from its enclosure, if it is installed in one.
- 4. Place the unit face-down on a static-dissipative mat in a location free from dirt and moisture and protected against static discharge.
- 5. Remove the screws securing the back cover.
- 6. Remove the back cover from the unit.
- 7. Proceed to the specific procedures you need to perform.
 - See Replacing DRAM on page 58
 - See Changing Jumper Settings on page 62

Replacing DRAM


All PowerStations use DRAM that is comparable to what is found in most PCs. The size and quantity of DRAM varies depending upon the PowerStation model and the CPU card that it uses. However, you can use the same procedure to add and replace DRAM on all models. Refer to the CPU manual that came with your PowerStation for more information about the size and quantity of DRAM your unit can support.

Removing a DRAM module

The PowerStation's DRAM is located on the CPU card. If you are upgrading your PowerStation's DRAM, you may need to remove the existing DRAM module, or SIMM, from the CPU card.

To remove a DRAM module, complete the following steps:

- 1. Perform the PowerStation disassembly procedure beginning on page 58 of this manual.
- 2. With the back cover removed, locate the SIMM on the left side of the CPU card, as shown below. The number of SIMMs present varies depending upon the PowerStation model and the manufacturer of the CPU card.




- 3. Push outward on the two clips holding the SIMM in its socket. As you push on the clips, the SIMM will move outward. It may be necessary to use a small screwdriver or the tip of a pen to push on the clips.
- 4. Tilt the SIMM slightly to the left, and lift it out of its socket at an angle.
- 5. Place the SIMM in an anti-static bag for storage if you do not plan to reinstall the SIMM at this time.

Installing a DRAM module

To install a DRAM module, complete the following steps:

 Place the new SIMM in the DRAM socket at an angle. The notch on the bottom of the SIMM should align with the ridge on the socket, as shown below.



- 2. Press the SIMM upright into the socket until the metal clips snap into place, securing the SIMM. The tabs on the socket must fit into the holes in the SIMM.
- 3. Perform the PowerStation reassembly procedure beginning on page 67 of this manual.

This completes the DRAM memory installation in your PowerStation. The PowerStation will automatically recognize the additional memory.

Adding PC/104 Cards

The P2 PowerStation supports PC/104 expansion cards. When adding PC/104 cards to the PowerStation, keep the following information in mind:

- The total combination of cards may not exceed the current limits specified for PC/104 cards in the PowerStation. See *Electrical Specifications* on page 12 of this manual for more information about the voltage and current available for expansion cards.
- The PowerStation does not support Plug-n-Play features. When selecting PC/104 cards, you must either select those with Plug-n-Play features that can be disabled or those without Plug-n-Play features. PC/104 cards with Plug-n-Play enabled may not perform correctly and may adversely affect PowerStation operation.

Address considerations

As in most ISA-bus computers, port addresses 300 through 31F are available for adapter functions. Addresses 310 through 317 are reserved for use by the PowerStation. Make sure that any adapter cards you install do not conflict with these addresses.

IRQ Considerations

IRQs 3, 4, 5, 7, 9, 10, 11, and 15 are available to adapter devices connected to the ISA-bus. The PowerStation configures these as shown below.



The IRQs in this table that are blank are available for use by any adapter card. Those marked with an asterisk (*) may be reconfigured by changing the jumper settings on the PowerStation's Ethernet/Power Supply board or CPU card.

Important Changing jumpers requires that you also modify the PowerStation's operating software. Therefore, you should only change the IRQs on your PowerStation after consulting the CTC Parker Product Technical Support department. See Changing Jumper Settings on page 62 of this manual for information about how to change jumper settings on the PowerStation.


Changing Jumper Settings

The PowerStation has three sets of jumpers located on the Ethernet/Power Supply board, as shown below. You can change these jumper settings if necessary. The first set of jumpers (JP7) allows you to change the touchscreen I/O address. The second set (JP1) allows you to restore the Ethernet port to a known configuration of IRQ 10 and I/O address 240H. The third set (JP6) allows you to change the touchscreen IRQ.



Note The preceding illustration shows the Ethernet/Power Supply board with the CPU card removed. See *Removing the CPU card* on page 64 for instructions on how to remove this card. The CPU card also has jumpers that may be changed. Refer to the CPU manual that came with your PowerStation for information about how to change these jumpers.

The following sections describe how you can change these jumper settings. In this discussion, jumpers set to "on" and "off" will look like those in the illustration below.



Note "Off" jumpers can be completely removed or placed as in the illustration above.

See Jumper Settings on page 25 of this manual for information about the jumpers' default settings.


JP7 Touchscreen address

This set of jumpers configures the touchscreen address. It is configured by turning the A and B ports "on" or "off." Use the following chart to determine the on/off combination for the port to which you would like to configure: COM1, COM2, COM3, or COM4.

To set the touchscreen jumpers to the default I/O address COM3 (3E8h), place the clips as seen below with the A port "on" and the B port "off." Set both jumpers to "on" to map the touchscreen to the COM4 port, also shown below.

Important After changing the jumper settings for the touchscreen I/O address, you must change the touchscreen configuration drivers for the changes to be implemented. See Reconfiguring the Touchscreen Driver on page 48 for complete instructions.



JP1 Ethernet default jumper

This jumper is used to restore the Ethernet configuration to IRQ 10 and I/O 240H. The jumper is located near the IDE hard drive connector on the Ethernet/Power Supply board. To restore the Ethernet configuration to IRQ 10 and I/O 240H, install a clip on this jumper.

JP6 Touchscreen IRQ jumpers


This set of jumpers is used to configure the hardware IRQs for the touchscreen. The touchscreen IRQ jumpers are located at the

lower left corner of the Ethernet/Power Supply board, just beneath the CPU card. To change these jumpers, you may need to remove the CPU card. This procedure is described below.

Removing the CPU card


To remove the CPU card, complete the following steps:

- 1. Disassemble the, following the procedure described beginning on page 58.
- 2. Refer to the illustration below for the remainder of this procedure.



- 3. Remove the screw that secures the CPU card support bracket. This screw is located inside the unit, just above the VGA port.
- 4. Remove the screw that secures the CPU card to the back cover.
- 5. Disconnect the four cables shown above. Pay attention to which socket you remove each cable from, so that you can properly reassemble the unit.
- 6. Gently, pull the CPU card out of its socket.

7. Change the touchscreen IRQ by moving the clip to the desired jumper. CTC Parker sets the touchscreen IRQ to 11, as shown below.




8. Re-install the CPU card by performing steps 1–5 in reverse order.

COM2 jumpers


CTC Parker configures the COM2 serial port on the CPU cards for RS-485 communications. However, you can configure this port to communicate using RS-232 or RS-422 by changing the jumper settings on the CPU cards. Refer to the cut-away diagrams of each CPU card that appear below and on the following pages for the exact placement of the jumpers for RS-232, RS-422, and RS-485 configurations.

386 COM2 Serial Port Configuration Diagrams


RS485 Configuration (default)



RS232 Configuration




RS422 Configuration




5x86 COM2 Serial Port Configuration


RS485 Configuration (default)

Reassembling the PowerStation

This section describes how to reassemble the PowerStation after you have finished performing internal maintenance on the unit.

Important When you reassemble the PowerStation, be sure to replace the same size screw in the same location as the one that was removed. Failure to do so could damage the unit.

To reassemble the unit, complete the following steps:

- 1. Replace the back cover and reinstall the screws that secure the cover.
- 2. Reinstall the unit in its enclosure, if it was previously installed in one.

- 3. Reconnect power to the unit.
- 4. Start up the PowerStation.

Resolving Common Problems

This section provides some basic troubleshooting steps to help you identify and correct problems you may have with the P2 Power-Station. Each problem is described, followed by one or more possible solutions. Begin with the first solution and continue until you have solved the problem or tried all of the solutions.

If the problem persists, look through the other problems listed in this section to determine if additional symptoms exist that might require action. If you cannot solve the problem yourself, or if you encounter a problem that is not documented in this section, contact your CTC Parker equipment supplier or the CTC Parker Product Technical Support department at (513) 248-1714.

Resolving Problems when Starting Up

Some of the most common problems that users encounter with PCs occur when they start up their systems. This section describes some possible problems that may occur in the PowerStation during startup and solutions for these problems.

Resolving AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS problems

Some start up problems are caused by a corrupted or modified AUTOEXEC.BAT or CONFIG.SYS file. CTC Parker includes backup copies of these files (AUTOEXEC.CTC and CONFIG.CTC) on the PowerStation Start disk. The text for AUTOEXEC.CTC appears below:

If you suspect a problem with either the AUTOEXEC.BAT or the CONFIG.SYS file of the PowerStation, use the DOS **copy** command to create a backup copy of your current file, and overwrite the suspect file with the appropriate backup file. 

- 1. Turn off the PowerStation.
- 2. Make sure that the power cord is properly plugged in. If it is not, make sure that the plug is firmly attached to the unit and the power source.
- 3. Turn on the PowerStation. If the fan does not come on, continue with step 4.

- 4. Disconnect the PowerStation from its power source.
- 5. Remove the PowerStation's back cover.
- 6. Check the fuse located on the internal power supply. If the fuse is blown, replace it. Use a 3.15A, 250 VAC Littelfuse 216.315 or its equivalent.
- 7. Turn on the PowerStation. If the fan does not come on, continue with step 8.
- 8. Check connector J2 (fan connection) on the CTC Ethernet/ Power Supply board to see if the fan is plugged in.
- 9. Secure the PowerStation's back cover.
- 10. Connect the PowerStation to its power source.
- 11. Turn on the PowerStation.

The fan starts, but the display does not

- 1. Turn off the PowerStation.
- 2. Disconnect the PowerStation from its power source.
- 3. Remove the PowerStation's back cover.
- 4. Make sure that the cables that connect to the display are properly connected. If they are not, make sure that each connector is firmly seated in its corresponding plug. Refer to the illustration below to see the locations of these cables.



5. Check the installation of the DRAM modules on the CPU board. Make sure that the modules are firmly seated in their sockets and that the socket latches are fully engaged.

- 6. Make sure that all cards are firmly seated.
- 7. Secure the PowerStation's back cover.
- 8. Connect the PowerStation to its power source.
- 9. Turn on the PowerStation.

The RAM test fails, or the total memory installed does not match the total contiguous RAM listed on the display following the RAM test

- 1. Turn off the PowerStation.
- 2. Disconnect the PowerStation from its power source.
- 3. Remove the PowerStation's back cover.
- 4. Re-seat the DRAM modules on the CPU board. Make sure that the modules are firmly seated in their sockets and that the socket latches are fully engaged.
- 5. Secure the PowerStation's back cover.
- 6. Connect the PowerStation to its power source.
- 7. Turn on the PowerStation.

Problems with the Touchscreen

This section lists some problems that may occur with the touch-screen and solutions to these problems.

After startup, the touchscreen does not work properly, or touchscreen calibration is incorrect

- 1. If the PowerStation appears to be operating correctly otherwise, restart the unit.
- 2. The touchscreen calibration might be in error. See *Recalibrating the Touchscreen* on page 52 of this manual for complete instructions.
- 3. Check the AUTOEXEC.BAT file. See *Resolving AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS problems* on page 69 of this manual for information about the lines that should appear in the AUTOEXEC.BAT file.
 - a. Verify that the following lines appear in the AUTOEX-EC.BAT file **before** the lines that load touchscreen driver:

IF EXIST C:\CTC\MOUSE.INI DELC:\CTC\MOUSE.INI LH C:\CTC\MOUSE

After calibrating the touchscreen, it either does not work or does not follow your finger

- 1. Make sure that the touchscreen cable has been properly connected. If the touchscreen cable is damaged, replace the touchscreen. Contact CTC Parker for information about purchasing a replacement.
- 2. Inspect the touchscreen for broken, loose, or frayed wiring. Secure any loose wiring. If you find broken or frayed wiring, replace the damaged wiring.

Problems after Starting Up

This section lists problems that may occur after startup and solutions to these problems.

The PowerStation locks up while starting and will not restart

- 1. Turn off the PowerStation.
- 2. Connect a keyboard.
- 3. Turn on the PowerStation. When the message "Starting MS-DOS" appears, press the F8 key. This will cause the system to step through the CONFIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC.BAT files line-by-line. If the "Starting MS-DOS" message does not appear, go to step 6.
- 4. Step through the CONFIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC.BAT files line-by-line until you find the cause of the lockup. Remove or correct the offending line in the CONFIG.SYS or AUTOEXEC.BAT file.
- 5. Restart the PowerStation to see if the problem has been solved.
- 6. If the system locks up before the "Starting MS-DOS" message appears, restart the PowerStation, and press the Delete key to enter the BIOS setup program.
- 7. Select the Standard CMOS Setup option or its equivalent, and restore the system defaults. This will restore the CMOS settings to their factory default configuration. Save these settings and exit the setup program.
 - Refer to the CPU manual that came with the PowerStation for more information about using the BIOS setup program.

The DOS prompt is displayed instead of the MachineShop Shell main menu

- 1. If the PowerStation appears to be operating correctly otherwise, restart the unit.
- 2. Make sure that the MachineShop Shell software is being loaded. Verify that the following lines appear in the AUTOEXEC.BAT file and do **not** have the word "REM" in front of them:

CD \CTC PSU

3. The AUTOEXEC.BAT file may be corrupted or may have been modified. See *Resolving AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS problems* on page 69 of this manual for information about the command lines that should appear in the AUTOEXEC.BAT file.

A serial mouse does not work

- 1. Make sure that the mouse is properly connected to the serial port.
- 2. If you have connected the mouse to COM2, verify that COM2 is configured for RS-232 communications. See *COM2 jumpers* on page 65 of this manual for instructions on how to change the communications protocol for this port.
- 3. Connect the serial mouse to the port you configured, and restart the PowerStation.

See *Connecting a serial mouse* on page 18 for information about how to configure the PowerStation to accept a serial mouse.

A keyboard does not work

- 1. If you are using a keyboard with a PS/2-style connector, make sure that the keyboard is properly connected to the keyboard port.
- 2. If you are using an AT-style keyboard, complete the following steps:
 - a. Make sure that you have properly connected the keyboard to the supplied PS/2 adapter cable. Make sure that the adapter cable is properly connected to the keyboard port.

- b. Make sure that the keyboard is an AT keyboard, not an XT keyboard.
- c. Try a new adapter cable.
- 3. Try using a new keyboard.

The Ethernet port does not work

- 1. Make sure that the Ethernet cable is plugged in.
- 2. Make sure that the networking software is being loaded. Verify that the following lines are present in the AUTOEXEC.BAT file and do **not** have the word "REM" in front of them:




3. Make sure that you have properly configured the networking software. See *Configuring the Ethernet Interface* on page 56 of this manual for information about how your networking software can be configured.
